# Coin of the Month

## Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential \$1 Coin

Franklin D. Roosevelt was the 32nd President. He is the longest-serving president in our history. His fifth cousin, Theodore Roosevelt, the 26th president, was the one who inspired FDR to be active in politics. The Great Depression was in full swing when FDR was elected in 1932. A classic example of his optimism was also one of his most famous quotes, from his first inaugural address: "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself."


FDR lost no time setting up programs to help the nation regain its financial foothold. He proposed a sweeping program called the "New Deal," which Congress enacted in 1933. Another wave of reforms included the Social Security Program and a huge work relief program for those without jobs.

In 1936, FDR was re-elected by a wide margin, and again in 1940 and 1944. The amendment limiting a president's terms to two, was proposed following FDR's death in 1945.

Roosevelt pledged the United States to the "good neighbor" policy, an agreement among nations in the Americas to support each other against foreign aggressors. He tried through neutrality to keep the United States out of World War II, yet at the same time sent help to friendly nations that were threatened or attacked.

When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, FDR rallied our resources for global war. At the same time, he put a lot of thought into the creation of a United Nations, where international conflicts would hopefully be settled.

FDR had been continually fighting polio since 1921.



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
