Jim Carman made a motion that the club pay for an ANA membership for all YNs. Kathy seconded the motion. The motion carried.

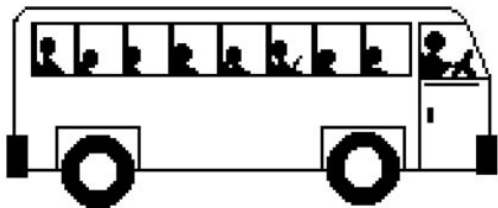
Jim Guy will hand out the ANA Summer Seminar Scholarship application at the next meeting.

## Fraisse Medal & Plaquette

Harry Waterson showed a medal and a plaquette by the French sculptor, Edouard Fraisse (1880-1945). Between WWI and WWII Fraisse specialized in sculpting awards for many different sports in France. He often repeated design elements. Two especially attractive pieces were awards for female running events.



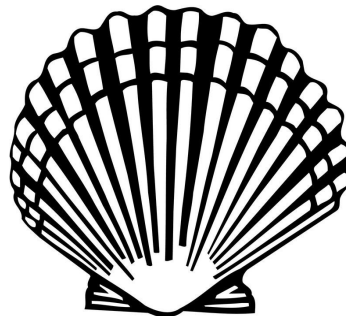
To the left is a 2-in. bronze running medal and to the right is a 2x3-in. silver-plated bronze plaquette using the same two runners from the medal on the centerpiece of the rectangle. This was a common artistic devise of Fraisse. Of all the different sports Fraisse depicted over the years, the two pieces shown here are truly superb examples of the same idea expressed in two different formats.

Metal in many shapes and sizes was used for money long before coins started making the rounds. Today we know about two groups of people who, thousands of years ago, started making objects similar to what we call coins. They stamped pieces of metal with weights (values) and other marks. This way they didn't need to weigh the metal each time it was used to buy something.

Who were these first coin creators? We've long known that around 600–700 B.C., people from Lydia (part of what is now Turkey) started stamping the royal emblem of a lion's head onto pieces of electrum. They got this alloy of gold and silver from the banks of Lydia's rivers. And recently, we've discovered that even earlier (about 1000 B.C.) people in China made bronze coins.

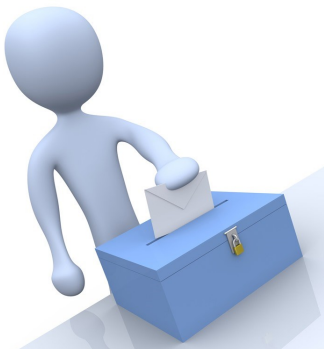
## 2018 Proposed Bylaw Changes

### 2018 WWI Centennial Silver Dollar

Although he campaigned on America staying out of the war, President Woodrow Wilson asked Congress for a declaration of war as a result of a series of events, including the sinking of the Lusitania, the Zimmerman Telegram, and the resumption of unrestricted submarine warfare. America mobilized for war, aiding the Allies by providing financial and other resources, weapons, and troops. With more than 4 million Americans serving both on the front lines and here at home, the United States of America tipped the momentum in favor of the Allies. The U.S. emerged from World War I as a new world power propelled by its strong economy, mobilized workforce, and contributions of its citizens.

The obverse of this design, titled “Soldiers Charge”, depicts an almost stone-like soldier gripping a rifle. Barbed wire twines in the right hand side of the design. Inscriptions include “LIBERTY”, “1918”, “2018: and “IN GOD WE TRUST.”

The reverse of this designed, titled “Poppies in the Wire”, features abstract poppies mixed with barbed wire. Inscriptions include “ONE DOLLAR”, “E PLURIBUS UNUM”, and “UNITED STATES OF AMERICA”.
